Highlighted Members of the Month: Steve and Karen Crump




Steve & Karen Crump 1975

A love story that started as a first date to the Sadie Hawkins dance in 1975 is turning 50 years old on December 22. Karen's best friend since the 4th grade, Linda, who happened to be Steve's cousin introduced Steve and Karen. The rest, as they say, is history. Steve says he let her talk as much as she wanted to, he did not have a chance, it was love. He proposed after graduation that year. Steve joined the National Guard, his basic training was in Ft. Leonard Wood that summer and they eloped when he came home for Christmas from Aberdeen, MD, where he was stationed for Advance Individual Training (AIT). Judge Hope made it official at the Topeka courthouse on December 22, 1975.

Their married life has taken them from Topeka, to Junction City, to Abilene, back to Topeka, to Enterprise and finally, back to Abilene for the last 22 years. Steve served 6 years with the National Guard, 635th Armored Division in Abilene. He worked at Vacublast until they closed, Forbes Field in Topeka, and as a welder with Great Plains Manufacturing. Karen was a homemaker, worked in the school food industry for 16 years and raised their three children: Stacy, David, and Lisa. She also had the opportunity to provide day care for her 5 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren over the years. Karen's favorite bible verse is Pselm 25:20 O guard my life, and deliver me; do not let me be put to shame, for I take refuge in you.

In 2015, Steve was medically retired after suffering from two separate strokes. His diagnosis was not good, but he has beat the odds. He had to learn to walk, talk, and eat again. He also taught himself how to write left-handed. His favorite bible verse is Philippians 4:13 I can do all things through him who strengthens me. He spoke about how he cannot read a newspaper or book very long without his vertigo stopping him, but he is able to read his Bible as long as he wants without any problems. I was moved when he told me about how he read the bible to his father, who accepted Jesus Christ as his savior before he passed.

They first attended FUMC with their daughter Stacy's family. They said that everyone was so welcoming that they kept coming back and became members in 2016. They listen every Sunday on the radio or on Facebook.

A Word From Pastor Libby

Friends,

When you receive this, we will be entering into the most Wonderful time of the year, as the song goes. We begin Advent and our wait for Christmas on Sunday, November 30. I am excited about this year of celebrating Christ's birth with you, seeing the beauty of the sanctuary prepared



for our celebrations, and being present with you. I am excited for our worship series "The Gift of Being Present," as we focus on being present with one another more than on the presents we will receive. It offers us the chance to not worry about the perfect gift or even whether we can gift everyone we want, but to focus on being present with one another as God is present with us throughout the seasons of our lives.

On the same theme, The Gift of Being Present, I would love you to be present with me on Saturday, December 13, for an Open House at the parsonage at 1601 N. Campbell Street, from 2-4 pm. This is a come-and-go kind of day with some holiday goodies and time together this season. If you can gift me with your presence, I will consider it a blessing. Please note that there are stairs up to the front door. Another gift for this season to go with this series is a wonderful, guided journal, which we will make available to you to follow along each week and journal about your experience. I think the journal will allow us to be more aware of God's presence among us. I will offer my thoughts each week on our Facebook page as I use the journal on this journey through Advent and to the celebration of a Savior born in a manger.

I am thankful that our leadership and worship design team were so thoughtful this year in how we might best meet the needs of our congregation and community as we plan for Christmas Eve services. This last visit he did not disappoint, as he saved up part of his allowance to contribute to the little pantry. Made me think, if a nine-year-old can contribute. What can we do? People always ask me-what can I do to help? What can I contribute? And I direct them to go down the hallway and look in the shelves and see what's empty. Let us also remember that- what you use, we can use, so there is no right or wrong answer. There is only no answer.

I am always reminded of my motto -when you do a little, a lot gets done. And I truly believe that everyone can do something... something anything, and it will be welcome and we are so very thankful for you.


Donations of cookies or other baked goods need To be brought to the church December 21-24, During office hours, 8 a.m. – 12 p.m.

From the Archives

Thank you to Kevin Bailey and David & Pam Haight for the article and for locating all the pictures and information the office askes for throughout the year. You are truly a blessing to us all.

Christmas hymns, seasonal sermons and the Christmas Eve candlelight service are all part of how our church celebrates the season but there are other ways as well. This month's newsletter features an assortment of photographs from past Christmas observances found in church records. The last twenty-five years of records are the most complete with only scattered examples surviving from earlier years. The following comes from December Sunday bulletins and a few specific copies of Christmas event programs that still exist.

A highlight every season is the children's program. In years past, it was performed live but during COVID a switch was made to a video format which according to Wendy puts the child actors more at ease and eliminates stage fright in front of live audiences.

Speaking of live performances, church history has seen such productions as the "Journey to Bethlehem" in at least the late 1990s to early 2000s. A cast of at least 55 parishioners took part in a live reenactment of the Christmas Story and spectators moved from scene to scene throughout the church. One such production resulted in an \$800 carpet-cleaning bill for a goat that piddled on the floor.

The congregation participates in decorating the sanctuary by hanging the greens, decorating the tree and providing poinsettias on the altar in honor and memory of loved ones.

Outreach in the form of the Shepherd's Run delivery of cookies and treats to people working on Christmas Eve began in the late 1990s and continues. Congregational caroling is yet another long standing tradition.

Most recently, we have held a Blue Christmas service for the past two years for the benefit of those who are experiencing grief, sadness and a sense of loss at this time of the year. Christmas is supposed to be a joyous time but it is not always for some.

Over the years, the congregation has participated in and enjoyed a variety of Christmas season activities and observances, and will continue to do so in years to come.
