

Get to Know

Clark Williamson

Director of Music Ministries



Clark Williamson is originally from Little River, Kansas, the son of Dean & Noreen Williamson.

He came from three generations of retail furniture merchants. There were three churches in Little River back then, Methodist, Catholic, and Congregational. Little River is also where Clark's musical experiences started with piano lessons in 3rd grade and church choirs. He also began playing the violin in 5th grade and continued performing with orchestras throughout his college years. His mother was a soprano soloist at church.

The family of six moved to Warrensburg, Missouri in 1964. Clark attended middle school, high school, and received a Bachelor of Music Education degree in town, on the campus of Central Missouri State University, now called U. of Central Missouri. He taught public school vocal music in Lexington & Grant City, Missouri for five years.

Clark felt the call to pursue church music full time and so he received his Masters of Sacred Music from Southern Methodist University in Dallas. Upon graduation at SMU, Clark worked at large UM churches in Decatur, AL and Crystal Lake, IL, in the Chicago area, and Sandy, UT before coming to Abilene FUMC in 2003. Clark was attracted to the idea of coming back to Kansas because it was closer to where his parents and brother were living at the time, before they passed.

Some of his many job responsibilities include: directing Chancel Choir, Bell Choir, scheduling the 3 pianists, the liturgists, and balcony tech volunteers each week, proofreading the bulletin, piano and instruments maintenance, keeping track of music budget & music memorials, and for the last 3 years he's been creating the slideshow for our worship services.

What is something people would be surprised to know? Clark's been an avid fan of "Jeopardy" since Art Fleming was host and when waiting for a train to pass or stopped at a red light, Clark thinks of words and names using the 3 consonants on the cars license plate in front of him.

A Word From Pastor Libby

Friends,

I want to thank you for the many cards and gifts I received from so many of you over the Christmas holidays, none more valuable than your presence at my open house and throughout the season of Advent and Christmas worship.

As we stepped into Epiphany, the season of revelation, you were invited to pick a star word to help guide you in how God might be revealing something new to you throughout the coming year. I heard from many of you that you received words that seemed meaningful for your situation. My word is mindfulness, meaning being actively open to the present. I pray you find meaning in the coming months as you explore, listen, and watch for your word.

The season of Lent begins in just a few weeks, on Ash Wednesday, February 18. For many people, the season of Lent is a time for reflection, sacrifice, and spiritual renewal. Speaking from experience and years of giving up something for Lent, I have come to realize that Lent is much more than giving up a favorite treat or attending extra church services or classes, though these are important. I see Lent as an opportunity to put our gifts to work and to grow by reaching out to others through acts of service.

Each year as Lent approaches, I find myself asking how I can become a better disciple of Jesus Christ and deepen my relationship with God. The answer seems to come in simple, everyday moments of service. Whether it is doing more to support food pantries, doing work to refresh something at church, checking on a neighbor, or simply offering a listening ear to a friend in need, these acts have a way of drawing me out of myself as I see the face of Christ in those around me.

Service during Lent is not about big acts or perfection; it is about small, consistent efforts to be more like Christ with our head, heart, hands, and spirit as we love and support others. I find that the depth of my growth is proportional to how willing I am to step outside my comfort zone and give of myself, even if it is inconvenient or requires some sacrifice on my part. When I focus on serving and using my God-given spiritual gifts, I am often overcome with humility and gratitude, knowing that I am serving others as the hands and feet of Christ. Transforming my Lenten journey from one of only self-denial to one of self-giving has not only impacted those I serve, but it has also been revelatory and transformative for me.

As I continue to embrace service as a central part of Lent, along with spiritual practices of prayer, fasting, and study, my heart is more open, my faith grows deeper and stronger, and my sense of connection to community expands. Lent is more than a season of preparing for the resurrection on Easter, but also a time to become more like the person God calls me to be – through simple acts of serving others with my hands, head, heart, and Spirit.

Workshops across conference to focus on Christian nationalism

Free workshops focusing on resisting Christian nationalism in our church pews and in our communities have been scheduled for throughout the first half of the year throughout the Great Plains Conference.



In 2025, the conference passed the resolution "Christian Nationalism: Mercy and Justice" both rejecting the tenets of Christian nationalism and committing to sponsor workshops "to provide education on understanding, recognizing, and eliminating the tenets of Christian Nationalism from worship and ministry in their congregation."

The Great Plains Mercy & Justice team will be hosting six practical workshops across the conference. All are from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays:

- Feb. 21: North Central and Western Kansas districts, at Salina Trinity UMC.
- Feb. 28: Southeast Kansas District, at Chanute.
- March 28: East Central and Northeast Kansas districts, at Lawrence First West Campus.
- April 11: Western and Central Nebraska districts at Kearney First UMC.
- April 18: South Central Kansas District at Wichita Woodland UMC.
- May 2: Eastern and Southeast Nebraska districts at Waverly.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

The Eight beautiful windows within the NAVE of our Church represent the Eight Beatitudes of Our Lord from the "Sermon On The Mount" found in Matthew Chapter 5 of the New Testament portion of the Bible. These lovely windows were designed by the artist Heinz Reuters and fabricated and installed by the Reinarts Art Glass Studios of Winona, MN.

Beginning at the front of the east side, from north to south, then on the west side, from south to north, in that order:

1. BLESSED ARE THE POOR IN SPIRIT Sunflower rising out of the thorns towards the crown and Chi Rho, symbolizing the soul rising from earthly difficulties toward Christ and Heavenly reward. The dove in the upper part represents the Holy Spirit lending strength and grace.
2. BLESSED ARE THEY THAT MOURN The weeping eye is a symbol for those who mourn; but the phoenix above, rising from the ashes, emphasizes that there is eternal life after death. The rising movement toward the sun is also a symbol of hope.
3. BLESSED ARE THE MEEK The lamb is a symbol of meekness the tree and globe depict the land.
4. BLESSED ARE THEY THAT HUNGER AND THIRST FOR RIGHTEOUSNESS The flaming sword recalls that hunger and thirst for justice often was accompanied by martyrdom and pain. Fortitude was built with the help of God, as indicated by the triangle, The Holy Trinity. Bible and shell in the lower part represent the Word of God and the sacraments by which they shall be filled.
5. BLESSED ARE THE MERCIFUL The classical caduceus is the universal symbol of aid and mercy.
6. BLESSED ARE THE CLEAN OF HEART Flash hitting head of serpent, symbolizing victory over sin. Hand holding the lily represents purity. The heart under the triangle stands for those "who are clean of heart and shall see God".
7. BLESSED ARE THE PEACEMAKERS The sword, partly inserted into the earth, symbolizes truce. The fruits of peace are represented by the olive branch
8. BLESSED ARE THEY THAT SUFFER PERSECUTION The small crosses under the sword and palms represent the many who encountered suffering and martyrdom for justice' sake. Their reward lies in Jesus Christ, who is symbolized by the crown.



FROM THE ARCHIVES

Music Theme: North end of west hall, back of choir loft.

The musical window has three trumpets in the upper section of the window, a harp in the center and an organ in the lower left corner. All of these instruments are used to sing the praises of the Lord.

Entry Hall Windows: From south to north tying old and new buildings together.

I AM THE GOOD SHEPHERD In the background is the shepherd's staff, and in the lower half is the sheep, symbolizing the flock that is the church, with Christ the shepherd and protector of the flock.

I AM THE ONE WHO SERVES Burning torch symbol of serving others. In lower area the pitcher, towel and bowl symbolic of one who serves others by acts of mercy.

I AM THE VINE Symbolic vine and branches entwined around Christ symbol. "I am the vine, and you are the branches."

I AM THE BREAD OF LIFE At the top the Chi Rho symbol of Christ underneath the wheat - bread and plate with Host, the fish the symbol of the early Christian, coming to God through Communion.

I AM THE DOOR The Chi Rho at the top of the window, with the door below with another symbol for Christ IHS. Symbolic of "I am the door, and no one comes to the Father except through me."

I AM THE WAY AND THE TRUTH Chi Rho and lamp symbol of lighting the way, and the Bible symbol of truth.
